# Louis Wenzlaff, president of the board of directors, opened the 81st Annual Meeting of TEC members on June 9 at the Thumb Octagon Barn.

An estimated 700 people attended the meeting, which was highlighted by the election of three directors and numerous entertainment activities featured as a part of TEC's Member Appreciation Day/Annual Meeting.

Elected to three-year terms for District 2 were Kevin Grifka, Huron County; Mike Briolat, Sanilac County; and Jonathan Findlay, Tuscola County. Others nominated for a director position were Donald Wolschleger, Huron County; Ernest Messing, Sanilac County; and Amanda Langmaid and Thomas Lounsbury, Tuscola County.

President Wenzlaff introduced TEC's Attorney Jason Bitzer and members of the current TEC board of directors including Donald Wolschleger, Beth McDonald and Randall Dhyse, Huron County; Kim Nunn, Mike Briolat and Duane Kursinsky, Sanilac County; and Jonathan Findlay and Carl Cousins, Tuscola County. General Manager Dallas Braun was also introduced.

President Wenzlaff recognized two TEC employees who recently retired and thanked them for their combined service of 50 years. Recognized were: Office Services Manager Jim Philp—40 years and Journeyman Lineman Paul Voss—10 years.



# TEC's Board President, Louis Wenzlaff, highlighted the following areas:

- The 2017 financial statement that showed operating revenues of \$20,861,513 and expenses of \$20,160,509 resulting in an operating margin of \$701,005. The cooperative also earned \$359,119 in interest on short-term investments, rental income, subsidiary income, and patronage capital from other cooperative organizations. Total margins for 2017 were \$1,060,124. Members' patronage capital accounts were allocated 4.5 cents on each dollar paid by TEC members in 2017. Thumb retired \$130,000 of this 2017 patronage along with another \$413,000 for the years of 1987 and 1988; this appeared as a credit on a separate line item on members' May 2018 electric bills.
- Since patronage capital retirements began, TEC has refunded over \$8.9 million back to its members.
- In 2017 TEC extended electrical service to 50 new accounts and invested \$4.8 million in new utility plant bringing TEC's total investment to \$96 million serving 12,232 member-consumers in the areas of Huron, Sanilac, and Tuscola.
- The cooperative continues to make capital investments in the electrical system. Just under \$5 million of upgrades are planned and under construction for 2018. TEC employees and outside line construction contractors will be performing the work.
- The cooperative paid \$830,647 in property taxes to schools and other governmental bodies in Huron, Sanilac and Tuscola counties in 2017.
- In 2017, the cooperative's Energy Optimization Program came in under budget and the 1.2 million kWh saved exceeded the state-mandated kWh goal.
- Through its subsidiary, Thumb Energy Services, the cooperative continues to offer competitive propane service to approximately 1,100 accounts in the Thumb Area.
- TEC recognized 30 employees for continuing to work safely and thanked them for their continued dedication and hard work during the past year.

# TEC's General Manager, Dallas Braun, highlighted the following:

- In April of this year, the monthly service charge was increased by \$5/month for most rate classes, which resulted in a rate increase of approximately 3.5 percent. The needed increase was due to weatherrelated events impacting the system in March and April of 2017.
- TEC continues its maintenance program, including aggressive right-of-way trimming, clearing, spraying and other system improvement programs.
- Line contractors are currently working on a 15-mile rebuild project from TEC's Kinde substation to TEC's Ubly substation. The new construction will consist of new poles and wires supporting transmission, distribution and fiber circuits.
- TEC has retained an engineering firm to perform a fiber feasibility study in the Thumb area.
- TEC has begun the process to select an Automatic Metering Infrastructure (AMI) vendor/system, with a tentative deployment date starting in 2019.
- TEC continues to offer a full slate of programs and services to its members to help become more energy-efficient and save money.
- The cooperative continues to work with its statewide and national organizations to ensure that issues that may affect the availability, reliability and affordability of electricity to its membership are heard by our elected officials in Lansing and Washington, D.C.
- The cooperative continues to support and promote Action Committee for Rural Electrification (ACRE), the Political Action Committee (PAC) for all electric cooperatives. All TEC members can participate directly through the Co-op Owners program.
- U.S. Congressman Paul Mitchell, State Representative Shane
  Hernandez, State Senator Mike Green, U.S. Senator Gary Peters'
  Regional Coordinator Dylan Hellus, and U.S. Senator Debbie
  Stabenow's Regional Manager Derrick Mathis were introduced and
  briefly spoke to the membership. All were recognized for their support
  of Thumb Electric Cooperative and the rural electric program.
- In closing his report, General Manager Dallas Braun urged members to continue their strong interest in Thumb Electric Cooperative, to stay engaged and thanked them for their support.

After the business meeting, a lunch was served, followed by entertainment for all family members with bucket truck rides, pony rides, barrel rides, candy drop, face painting and other family activities. In action taken after the Annual Meeting, the board of directors elected Louis Wenzlaff—president, Kim Nunn—vice-president, Beth McDonald—secretary, and Randy Dhyse—treasurer.


## Washington, D.C. Highlights

## 1. Ask Questions

Don't shy away from making conversation with the vendors at a local farmers market. Unlike a grocery store setting, shoppers are given the opportunity to learn more about what they're purchasing, ask questions and get advice for their own growing/gardening purposes. Some vendors may even have insight on cooking methods or tasty food pairings.

# 2. Bring Bags And Cash

Farmers market vendors do not usually supply shopping bags. Bringing reusable bags from home guarantees a means of carrying purchases while reducing waste. It's also common for farmers market vendors to only accept cash, so be sure to have bills and small change on hand before heading out the door.

# 3. Pick The Right Time To Go

Crowds at the market tend to pick up around midday, so it's best to arrive right as it opens. Early shoppers have a better chance of avoiding lines, getting advice from vendors and picking from high-demand fruits or vegetables. On the other hand, those in the market for a good deal may want to visit later in the day. Oftentimes farmers market vendors will discount their products instead of risking waste.

## 4. Know Seasonal Produce

Having an idea of what produce is in season can help set expectations for purchases at the market. Research what grows in the area, talk to the farmers about what produce will be coming and plan shopping trips from there. Many farmers markets provide customers with a crop calendar at the information booth to show when various fruits and vegetables will be available.

## 5. Meal Plan Beforehand

Going to the farmers market without a list or plan may lead to unnecessary purchases. To avoid waste, look around the kitchen and get an idea of which foods might pair well for meals in the week ahead. Use the seasonal produce available at the market for inspiration and explore using any leftover produce in a new soup, salad, sandwich or casserole recipe.

#### Crustless Quiche

Mary Gavlek, Great Lakes Energy

- ½ cup Bisquick
- 3 eggs
- 1/2 cup melted butter
- 1/4 teaspoon salt
- 1/4 teaspoon pepper
- 1½ cups milk
  - 1 cup shredded cheese
  - · cooked chopped meats of choice
  - · diced vegetables of choice

Preheat oven to 425 F. Mix together Bisquick, eggs, butter, salt, pepper, milk and cheese with a wire whip. Add meat and vegetables. Pour into a round pie plate or 9×9 square pan. Bake uncovered for 45 minutes. Let stand 5 minutes, serve and enjoy.

### Rise N' Shine Eggs

- 2-3 tablespoons butter
  - 4 large eggs
- 1/3 cup grated sharp cheddar cheese
- 1/3 cup seeded and chopped tomatoes
- 1-2 teaspoons prepared horseradish (not cream
- Tabasco sauce, to taste
- salt and pepper

Melt butter in a skillet over medium heat. In a mixing bowl, whisk eggs until almost totally homogenized. Add eggs to skillet and stir gently. After they have begun to thicken, add remaining ingredients. Stir until cheese melts and is incorporated. Serve immediately.



#### **Potato Crusted Ouiche** With Morels, Ramps, Asparagus, Bacon And Swiss

Bonnie Langworthy, HomeWorks Tri-County

- 2 medium potatoes, peeled and sliced
- 2 tablespoons oil
- ½ cup ramps (leeks), chopped
- 1/2 cup roasted red bell pepper, chopped
- 1/4 cup morel mushrooms, coarsely chopped
- ¼ cup blanched asparagus, chopped

- 34 teaspoon dried thyme
- 8 strips bacon, cooked crisp
- 4 ounces gruyere cheese, grated
- 8-10 large eggs
  - ½ cup half & half
  - 1/4 teaspoon salt
  - 1/4 teaspoon ground pepper
  - pinch of nutmeg

Preheat oven to 350 F. Lightly grease a 9-inch pie pan. Blanch potatoes in salted, boiling water for 11/2 minutes. When cool, place a single layer of potatoes in the pan, slightly overlapping. Stand up slices (also overlapping) around edge. Heat oil in large skillet over medium-high heat. Add ramps (leeks), red pepper, morels, asparagus and thyme and sauté 5 minutes. Spoon mixture on top of potatoes. Crumble bacon on top of veggie mix. Spread cheese on top. Whisk together eggs, half & half, salt, pepper and nutmeg. Whisk until color lightens. Pour into pie dish. Bake for 35 minutes. Cool 25 minutes and serve in wedges.

When Courageous Coffee's Tanya Schneider puts so much soul into roasting the perfect coffee beans, it seems a shame not to take advantage of all that heartfelt flavor. She shares a recipe that uses brewed coffee for the ultimate coffee companion.



#### Cappuccino Muffins

- 2 cups all-purpose flour
- 3/4 cup sugar
- 2½ teaspoons baking powder
- ½ teaspoon salt
- ½ cup milk

- 1/2 cup strong brewed coffee
- ½ cup butter, melted
- 1 large egg
- 1 teaspoon vanilla extract
- 1 cup miniature semisweet chocolate chips

Preheat oven to 350 F. In a large bowl, combine the flour, sugar, baking powder and salt. In another bowl, combine the milk, coffee, butter, egg and vanilla. Stir into dry ingredients just until moistened. Fold in chocolate chips.

Fill greased muffin cups two-thirds full and bake for 15–20 minutes or until a toothpick comes out clean.

Serve with cream cheese spread (optional).

#### **Cream Cheese Spread**

- 4 ounces cream cheese, softened
- 1 tablespoon sugar
- 1/2 teaspoon vanilla extract
- 1/4 cup miniature semisweet chocolate chips

Mix all ingredients together until well blended and spread on muffins.

# CO-OP **NEWS**

#### Two TEC Students Attend Youth Tour

Pearl Daskam of Ubly and Jazmyn Warchuck of Ruth were chosen to attend the 2018 NRECA Youth Tour in Washington D.C. on June 9-14 as representatives of Thumb Electric Cooperative. Each year electric cooperatives throughout the state of Michigan and the country choose to send students to this leadership event. This year's itinerary included visits to the U.S. Capitol, museum tours, Washington D.C. landmarks and war memorials, and a show at the Signature Theatre. The students had the opportunity to meet with their legislators in action and to obtain leadership skills for their future endeavors. #### System Upgrades

Thumb Electric contractors will continue upgrading and rebuilding the 41.6KV transmission line between Ubly and Kinde this summer. The concentration of work is expected to be along M19 from M142 to Ubly, as well as removal of the old lines and poles from the deep right-of-way from Richardson Road to the Kinde substation. There will also be a few single phase rebuild projects this summer. Moeller Road between Crockard and Hellems roads in Dwight Township will be rebuilt, and Purdy Road between Parisville and Minden along with Minden Road between Purdy and Leppek in Paris Township, are all rebuilding projects slated for this summer.

#### **Tree Trimming Efforts Continue**

Tree trimming continues at an aggressive pace during 2018. Removing trees from the power lines has helped many TEC members see their reliability greatly improve. Removing and trimming trees makes for fewer outages, and shorter duration of outages that do occur. Priorities will continue for line sections that are historically problematic lines, followed by scheduled circuit work. As time allows, less severe circuits will be maintained.

Members in Vassar, Dayton (especially Shay Lake area), Juniata and Indianfield townships will see crews as well as part of regular system maintenance, and we anticipate starting to work on circuits in Kingston and Koylton townships.

Due to a disease in the Ash tree, which is a very popular species of tree in our service territory, we have had to adjust our trimming locations. It has made planning a challenge at times, but we make every effort to contact members ahead of the trimmers.



We will send out a postcard to members to let them know trimmers will be in the area and, at times, we will try and call members to provide notice. If you have an updated phone number, please call us with your new contact information.

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# Courageous The Perfect Blend

hile coffee is a daily part of many people's lives there are some folks for whom coffee is more than a ritual. it's a calling.

For Tanya Schneider, her fascination with coffee started early in life.

As a young girl, she would get up in the morning with her father, an otherwise busy man, and watch him sit down with a simple coffee cup and relax. By the time she was six, she'd asked for her first mug of coffee, served with an ice cube and a dash of milk. It was love at first sip.

Years later Schneider began to educate herself more deeply. She read books on the growing seasons of coffee beans and how to roast them. While Michigan weather would never allow her to grow her own beans, it couldn't keep her from roasting them.

Armed with her first coffee roaster. which was the size of a toaster oven and only roasted about a quarter-pound of beans at a time. Schneider trial and errored her way into her craft. She saved money along the way with a bigger dream in the back of her mind.

In 2010, Schneider, who is employed with HomeWorks Tri-County Electric Cooperative, had an opportunity to roast her coffee for military care packages that were being assembled at work.



"It felt so good to roast for someone else, instead of just myself and my family," said Schneider. "I knew that if this ever grew—the purpose would have to be bigger than myself."

In 2016, Schneider found herself on a mission trip to Belize with a group of individuals from church. In the evenings, she and the other women on the team sat together and shared stories about their lives and connected with one another. Schneider shared with them that she'd just started a business the month before—Courageous Coffee.

"I shared that I roasted coffee—mostly for family and friends—and I told them of my mission to make a difference by roasting coffee," said Schneider. "I was so amazed by their support and it gave me a huge boost of confidence that I really needed in order to move forward."

At that moment, Courageous Coffee went from a quiet passion to a full-blown dream come true.

Soon after the mission trip, she and her husband bought the future home of Courageous Coffee—a 12x12 Amish-built building that found itself on the back of the couple's property. Next

came a larger, upgraded roaster and a few 150-pound bags of quality coffee beans. By the end of the year she'd sold her first bag of coffee to a co-worker. Within a few months several local businesses were carrying Courageous Coffee for sale and it was available for purchase online at mycourageouscoffee.com.

Since then, Schneider has been roasting her heart out. In line with her early vision to have her business serve others, 10 percent of all proceeds are donated to nonprofit causes.

For Schneider, Courageous Coffee is an homage to perfect moments over a cup of joe and a knowing nod to seemingly impossible dreams. Bold, strong, courageous—it really is the perfect blend for coffee. And for life.





Courageous Coffee's next service mission to give back is a specialty blend that's brewing to support the next *Partners* for *Power* project by Michigan's electric cooperatives.




